Write down those ideas, review them against the fellowship criteria, and develop the one that fits best; then apply.



My proposal focused on comparing northern Italian passport collections across archives, strengthening my Italian language and paleography skills, and sharing results to raise awareness and help others overcome brick walls.

Strathclyde Institute Conference Call

The Strathclyde Institute for Genealogical Studies (SIGS) will hold an international 2-day academic genealogy conference in Scotland at the University of Strathclyde from 25–26 June 2026. Entitled **Beyond the Family Tree: Interdisciplinary Perspectives on AI, DNA, Education, and Community in Genealogy**, the conference will be hybrid.



Prior to this, on 24 June, a separate symposium on professional genealogy practice hosted by Association for Professional Genealogists (APG) will be held on campus and via hybrid access. (Symposium speakers are by invitation only).

Speakers from a variety of disciplines and backgrounds are invited to share their experiences and thoughts around the following themes:

- Intersection of genealogy/family history and history
- Genealogy education / genealogy as an academic discipline
- Use of AI in genealogy
- Innovative uses of genealogy/family history in research in other fields (such as history, psychology, archaeology, museum studies, etc.)
- Community development/cohesion and family history
- Looking back and forward at developments in genealogy over the last 20 years and into the future (what will genealogy be in 20 years?)
- Ethics in genealogy
- Genetic Genealogy: the following topics and their implications for genetic genealogy: ancient DNA, forensic investigative genetic genealogy (FIGG), genetic testing technologies, and reference sequences, mtDNA.

Proposals beyond these themes will also be considered.

All proposals must be submitted via email by December 08, 2025. Acceptance decisions will be sent out by end of December 2025.

Speakers and poster presenters will receive free registration for the Strathclyde conference.



Helping Potential Clients Find You

Your member listing in the APG directory is one of the best ways of helping clients to find you. The directory (http://bit.ly/4hqexRX), lists members based around the world, with their particular specialities, qualifications and locations.

However, it can be off-putting to potential clients when they are searching for a genealogist to see search results include people who do not live in the location in which they are seeking help. For example, if I'm searching for a genealogist based in one country and I get genealogists living in a different country, that might be frustrating.



To help you get your profile to match successfully with clients, here's a quick summary of where and when you use locations:

Your business	This appears on the search results and under your profile picture
address	on your profile page. It can have as much or as little detail as you
	want.
Based In	This is where you can do on the ground research. You are limited
	to two options here. Potential clients search for researchers
	through the search boxes.
Researches In	These are the localities where you have the skills and
	knowledge to do research. Potential clients search for
	researchers through the search boxes.
Geographic	This is a text box where you can add the places you research.
Specialities	There is more flexibility here to be specific about locations and
	potential clients will be able to find you through a keyword
	search.
Repositories	This is a text box where you can add the places you research.
	There is more flexibility here to be specific and potential clients
	will be able to find you through a keyword search.

We know you want to be found, but at the same time you also don't want to put clients off by suggesting you live in a place and can access resources for them, when you don't. (Contracting an on-site researcher when you live somewhere else is not the same as being based in a place). A gentle reminder that Item 2 of our **Code of Ethics and Professional Practices** is to "Represent my abilities, credentials and services accurately, and avoid the use of misleading or exaggerated statements."

The Salish Sea region of the North American Pacific Northwest hosts the land of numerous Coast Salish nations. As far as canoes can paddle, opportunity abounds. Relations span borders, languages revive and restrictive laws wane, despite the intense strain on Coast Salish nations from outside government

interference. Families made hard choices when aggressors blighted opportunities. Many historical narratives of the Pacific Northwest center colonial perspectives, eschewing Indigeneity.

This deficit means we must bring ancestral voices to the limelight. How can I prevent harm when researching these mighty cedar branches? Who can I learn from? What contexts included Coast Salish people in records? What value does genealogy have? Join us for this enlightening and thoughtful presentation.

About the Presenter

Masen Brandon is a professional genealogist specializing in Scandinavian and Pacific Northwestern families. He is a member of the Snohomish Tribe of Indians, making heritage of Coast Salish people a lifelong pursuit. Masen values learning part of an exceedingly rare language and listening to storytelling sessions from local tribes. Indigenous-centered research is an inflection point of his research, but on the opposite side of the world, Masen resided in Denmark for a time, facilitating lived experience in Scandinavian context, culture and language. When planning his business identity, Genealogical Factors, Masen's background was in written translations (Danish & English), essay & fiction writing. He cemented the business's bedrock with volunteer work, completing certificates at IIGS, and dabbling in a self-created Rikheim one-name study. Masen's most unique offering is Family History 101, a class at the University of Utah.

Additionally, attendees will gain insight into the challenges in supporting dual citizenship requirements.

Franchesca Werden is a professional genealogist specializing in Italian genealogical research and forensic genealogy. She has more than thirty-five years of experience conducting Italian genealogical research. Franchesca works with clients who want to learn more about their Italian ancestors or who wish to reclaim their right to Italian citizenship by descent. She frequently lectures about Italian research and dual citizenship.

Franchesca taught the dual citizenship module for the institute course *Beyond Fundamentals: Hands On Forensic Genealogy*, which has been presented at both SLIG and GRIP. Her company also provides probate and estate research to a number of law firms. Franchesca is on the teaching team for Boston University's Genealogical Principles course. She holds a B.S. from Boston University in Broadcasting and Film, and is a graduate of B.U.'s Certificate in Genealogical Research program.

David Ryan is an oral historian and genealogist based in Cork City, Ireland. He graduated the inaugural two-year Diploma in Genealogy at University College Cork, and completed a Master in Public History at the University of Limerick. David specializes in assisting people to trace their Irish ancestry.

Michael Gierszon works with Your Roots in Poland, where he specializes in assisting applicants with Polish citizenship by descent. Having handled hundreds of cases, he has strong relationships with public offices and has honed an understanding of the nuances of civil law and documentary requirements. He constantly strives to maintain and expand his knowledge with the latest interpretations, practices, and regulations that affect final citizenship application decisions issued by the Provincial Office. He has assisted descendants of emigrants from around the world to reclaim citizenship in Poland - including clients in the United Kingdom, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, the United States, Argentina, and Israel.

Michael is a 2014 graduate of the Faculty of History at the Jagiellonian University (MA). His research interests are the history of religion and religiosity – to which he devoted his bachelor's and master's theses, as well as the history of the Early Middle Ages, especially the Mediterranean basin. He ran a blog called 'Peculiar Histories' devoted to popularizing unknown and unusual stories on the border of the history of dynasties and world history.
