APG Launches Professional Genealogist Readiness Tool for Members

The APG On-Ramp Committee set a 2025 goal to produce a readiness tool for members to assess their professional journey. During the Annual Members' Meeting on 16 December that goal was achieved!

The Professional Genealogist Readiness Tool helps you understand where you are in your professional journey and provides ideas for where you might want to go next. The Readiness Tool offers a chance to pause, take stock of your skills, and think about your goals with a little more clarity.



Karin Coppernoll, PLCGS, APG On-Ramp Committee Chair, says, "the Professional Genealogist Readiness Tool recognizes that there is no single path into genealogy. It empowers hobbyists, aspiring professionals, and practicing professionals to reflect honestly, identify next steps, and engage with standards in ways that elevate their work and the profession as a whole."


This tool walks you through five main areas of professional genealogy:

- Your dedication to genealogy—how you approach research, work with different types of stories, and communicate your findings.
- **Education and growth**—your training, continuing education, and your willingness to try new methods and tools.
- **Standards and evidence**—how you apply recognized standards, analyze conflicting information, and document your work.
- **Business and client work**—how you handle communication, contracts, confidentiality, and basic business practices.
- **Ethics and privacy**—your care with sensitive information, record stewardship, and managing potential conflicts of interest.

Rate yourself on a 1-4 scale to receive an honest reflection on how often and how confidently you use each skill.

Both a detailed definition and representative examples are available for each competency area. These are helpful because they show what different levels look like in real-world genealogy. After you total your scores, the tool gives you a readiness level—from "Building Your Foundation" to "Advanced Professional Readiness." But, that's only part of the story.

The companion document, "Take the Next Step," turns this into a real professional growth plan. The professional growth plan consists of reflection questions, concrete action steps, and a curated list of books, webinars, and *APG Quarterly* articles matched to your readiness level. If you're building skills, you'll see beginner-friendly resources. If you're stepping into professional practice, you'll find tools focused on reports, ethics, and contracts. If you're more advanced, you'll see ideas related to mentoring, presenting, writing, and leadership.



Together, these three pieces form a full toolkit for your development. The Professional Genealogist Readiness Tool is available online in the Members' Area of the APG website. You can complete it interactively or you can download it to complete at your own pace. Use this link to get to the Readiness Tool: https://www.apgen.org/professional_readiness_tool.php (you must be logged in as a member). At this time, the tool is for APG members only.

A conscious effort was considered to create a tool that supports our global APG community—with fifty of your colleagues participating in testing to help us refine it. Many of the examples and resources still very much reflect a United States perspective. We welcome your recommendations for international resources so we can strengthen the tool for genealogists working in all regions.

Grahame T. Smallwood Jr. Award of Merit – Annette Burke Lyttle, CG (Florida, USA)



This award recognizes an APG member for their personal commitment and outstanding service to the Association. Annette exemplifies this commitment, serving as president from 2022-2023 and finishing a term as past president this month. She previously served as an atlarge board member and was coordinator of APG's Professional Management Conference from 2017-2019. Annette speaks on a variety of topics at the national, state, and local levels, and is editor of *The Florida Genealogist*. During her tenure as president, Annette oversaw the rebuilding or reimagining of many aspects of APG operations with decisive,

calm, and well-measured leadership. She helped the association navigate the uncertainty of the COVID-19 pandemic, updated antiquated bylaws, began the process of building a new website, and established the Listening and On-Ramp Committees.

Laura G. Prescott Award for Exemplary Service to Professional Genealogy – Jill Morelli, CG, CGL (Washington, USA)



This award recognizes service to the field of professional genealogy, exemplary professionalism, and continuing encouragement to other professional genealogists. Jill is a writer, lecturer and genealogical researcher, who after receiving her BCG certification in 2017, began the Certification Discussion Group (CDG) to help demystify the process of the certification journey. LaBrenda Garrett-Nelson, CG, CGL, exemplifies this award's criteria of exceptional professional achievement with contributions to the field of genealogy through individual excellence and ethical behavior. LaBrenda became a Board-Certified Genealogist in 2015, and for the Board for Certification of Genealogists (BCG) has served as Treasurer and Trustee, as well as President from 2019-2022. APG's Continuing Education Reporting Form is Now Available

APG's Continuing Education Reporting Form is now live and will be available through 31 January 2026. APG members are required to report at least 12 hours of 2025 Continuing Education. Please click **here** to access the CE Reporting form, or **here** to request an exemption.

Conferences, institutes, courses, webinars, and self-directed education are just some of the items that qualify for inclusion as reportable Continuing Education hours for 2025. Those who have been members of APG for less than one year are exempt from the requirement.



Although only twelve hours are required, the online form allows for the description of additional hours for those who wish to offer an expanded account of their experience. Members will be asked to describe several of their educational experiences in 2025, indicate which activities were most helpful to them, and describe any opportunities that they sought out but could not find.

If extenuating circumstances prevented the completion of the requirement for 2025, the form offers an opportunity to ask for an exemption.

Ohio Genealogical Society Issues Call for Lecture Proposals

The Ohio Genealogical Society (OGS) seeks lecture proposals for its 2027 conference, **Finding Your Family's Heroes**, to be held 28 April—1 May 2027, at Sharonville Convention Center in Sharonville, Ohio, USA.

Topics being considered include but are not limited to the following: immigration, census records, religious groups, migration, origins of early Ohio settlers, the Old Northwest Territory, "movers and shakers" of early Ohio, early Ohio River settlements, utilizing land records, military records, technology (including usage of mobile devices, apps, social media), AI for genealogy, DNA, organization, society management and development, methodology, analysis, and problem solving in genealogical research, Ohio history and its records, and archives and repositories.

The program committee is specifically seeking new, unusual, and dynamic proposals, inviting applicants to "think outside of the box." Interested speakers are strongly encouraged to submit multiple proposals for either one-hour general sessions, or two-hour workshops. There is no limit to the number of proposals a speaker may submit. The deadline for submission of lecture proposals is 31 May 2026.

Proposals should be submitted in PDF format, and must include the following to be considered:

- Speaker's name, address, telephone, and e-mail address
- Lecture title, not to exceed ten words, and a brief, but comprehensive outline
- Lecture summary, not to exceed twenty-five words to be used in the conference booklet
- Identification of the audience level: beginner, intermediate, advanced, or all
- Speaker biography, not to exceed twenty-five words
- Resume of prior speaking experience

All proposals should be sent via e-mail to **ogsconference@ogs.org** by no later than Midnight, 31 May 2026 ET (please visit **https://www.timeanddate.com** for worldwide time equivalents). Multiple proposals may be sent in one email, but applicants should limit their submissions to no more than two emails. Speakers will be required to use an electronic presentation program, with projectors provided by Sharonville Convention Center.

Compensation

Selected speakers will receive an honorarium, travel compensation, conference registration, hotel, and per diem rate based on the number of days lectures are presented. Sponsored speakers will only receive conference registration and syllabus materials.

Sponsors

Societies and businesses are encouraged to submit proposals for sponsored talks. The sponsoring organization will cover speaker's lecture(s) honorarium. Sponsored speakers will abide by all speaker deadlines. Sponsored speakers will receive complimentary OGS conference registration and electronic syllabus materials. 


Chinese in Washington: The Legacy of the Chinese Exclusion Act, by Trish Hackett Nicola (History Press, 2026).

One of the principal objectives of the Association of Professional Genealogists (APG) is to encourage high standards of ethical conduct and professional practice in dealings with clients and other members of the public. To further that objective, all members of APG agree to adhere to the APG Code of Ethics and Professional Practices (hereinafter, Code of Ethics).

- (1) a truthful approach to genealogy, family history, and local history;
 - (2) the trust and security of genealogical consumers;
- (3) careful and respectful treatment of records, repositories and their staffs, other professionals, and genealogical organizations and associations.
